This year we will be screening the following films at Tilton Library at 6:45 p.m.: Captain Phillips, the true story of Captain Richard Phillips and the 2009 hijacking by Somali pirates of the US-flagged MV Maersk Alabama, the first American cargo ship to be hijacked in two hundred years, will be shown on February 7th. Baggage Claim, a comedy about flight attendant Montana Moore who embarks on a thirty-day, thirty-thousand-mile expedition to charm a potential suitor into becoming her fiancé, screens on the 14th. Spinning Plates, a documentary about three unique restaurants and their respective owners is scheduled for February 21st. Our last film, to be shown on the 28th, is All is Lost, an open-water thriller about one man's battle for survival against the elements after his sailboat is destroyed at sea. January 16th: *TransAtlantic* by Colum McCann - A tale spanning 150 years and two continents reimagines the peace efforts of democracy champion Frederick Douglass, Senator George Mitchell, and World War I airmen John Alcock and Teddy Brown through the experiences of four generations of women from a matriarchal clan

February 20th: *The Orphan Master's Son* by Adam Johnson – discussion leader Judy Holmes. A juxtaposition of the vicious atrocity of the North Korean regime with the tenderness of beauty, love and hope. Winner of the Pulitzer Prize

March 20th: *The Goldfinch* by Donna Tartt – reserve this high demand title now. Composed with the skills of a master, *The Goldfinch* is a haunted odyssey through present-day America, and a drama of almost unbearable acuity and power. It is a story of loss and obsession, survival and self-invention, and the enormous power of art.
